Chapter 19

Pay It Forward: Sharing the Big Idea.

"God authorized and commanded me to commission you: Go out and train everyone you meet, far and near, in this way of life, marking them by baptism in the threefold name: Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. Then instruct them in the practice of all I have commanded you. I'll be with you as you do this, day after day after day, right up to the end of the age."

We can be thankful that God himself is so missional. Where would we be if he just hung out in heaven and left us to our own devices? Thankfully, he gave us his Word and his Life. Jesus came for us and gave it all so we could know him and his Kingdom. The Kingdom is the Good Life!

The love of Jesus compels us to share the Good News. Having experienced that love, we'll be keen to share it with those we love and care for and those we live and work with.

That's exactly what Jesus asks us to do.

But first, let's start with some research into some common spiritual beliefs. ¹ A recent study by the Barna Group showed why we need to be sensitive as we share the Kingdom.

The following percentages represented those in full agreement with each of the statements below:

24% - "I have heard everything church leaders have to teach."

34% - "The Church does not answer my questions."

36% - "My beliefs aren't aligned with the Christians I know."

51% - "I distance myself from the politics of the Church."

This is a big challenge for every follower of Jesus.

We are far from perfect. The mission of Jesus has gotten mixed up with buildings, money, and politics. Many churches are not connecting meaningfully with unchurched people.

The polarization of the culture has stunted discourse, and discussions of faith are received poorly in the public square. In this context, followers of Jesus are naturally defensive.

The world of the first century was even more hostile to the message of Jesus. Yet, he has left us with a mission – to make disciples that make disciples.

The mission of Jesus was first given to twelve ordinary men that he lived with for 3+ years. He showed them his ways of doing things. When it was time, they went into the world the way he did, moving relationally through their natural networks and finding others who would do the same.

It's a very long story to understand how this missional approach of Jesus was lost, so I won't bore you with the details.

Fortunately, the ways of Jesus and his disciples are being rediscovered today by paying close attention to the stories in the four accounts of Jesus' life (Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John), the book of Acts, and the letters written by his followers. These methods and the necessary lifestyle to make them work are very clearly described in these Scriptures.

Like the seven steps of transformation in Chapter 13, there are also seven steps to inviting others to follow Jesus:

- 1. *Pray* people don't come to Jesus unless God draws them. Remember the spiritual battle around us? We must pray!
- 2. *Train* teach others to talk about Jesus and to find the people of peace that God has been preparing.

- 3. *Engage* serve your community and ask the people of peace to gather their friends to hear and discover God's Word.
- 4. *Obey* ask the Spirit to guide leaders and explorers into understanding and obedience.
- 5. *Coach* as they grow, coach discovery groups to follow the seven growth steps in chapter 13 as they become a church.
- 6. Multiply teach church members to repeat steps 1-5 and plant new discovery groups.
- 7. *Release new leaders* as new churches are formed, train new leaders and release them, and repeat the process.

In the 300 years after Jesus, the church grew to represent about 10% of the population of the Roman empire, about 6 million Christ-followers. This was done in a world where they were powerless, ridiculed, and marginalized.

They had no buildings, seminaries, or Bibles like we do today. It was all done by ordinary people sharing Jesus stories they had memorized, reading copies of the Apostle's letters, and spreading the Word in their natural networks, meeting in their homes, and loving their neighbors.

Obedient disciples are now catalyzing amazing movements of new believers all over the world. More than 100 million new disciples have resulted from these efforts, and 8 million new churches have been started in the past 30 years. Very few of these churches have buildings, they typically have 15-20 people meeting in homes. ²

Marianne and I recently returned from a trip to Nairobi, Kenya where we met 250 of these ordinary people who are catalyzing movements in 45 countries.

They are sharing the love and Good News of Jesus and encouraging everyone to do the same. They are demonstrating the power of reading God's Word, obeying what they learn, serving one another in a community of generosity, and inviting friends and neighbors to join in and do the same.

We will tell friends about a new film or restaurant that we love. How much more important is it to share what Jesus has done for us and to invite others to discover the same for themselves? We have more Kingdom opportunities than we can imagine.

Here are two recent examples.

I sent a draft of this book to my friend Michael who lives in Canada. We worked together for several years in the 80's. He is a devout Jew. After reading the manuscript, he had many questions. He was surprised to learn Jesus was Jewish and that he could follow Yeshua (his Jewish name) while continuing to be Jewish.

One day he called me excitedly to share that he was following Jesus. Like the early Jewish believers (Peter, John, and Paul) he had discovered that Jesus was his true Messiah.

We walked the 800 kilometers-long Camino de Santiago in the fall of 2022. We met people, shared stories, and talked about the Kingdom. Robert was from Germany and Bethany was from China, and they were drawn to each other.

Marianne and I had long days walking through Spain, talking about God and sharing stories. They wanted the Kingdom. Their engagement led to Zoom calls to study what the Bible says about marriage. It was a privilege to marry them and pray with them as they set out to build a Kingdom family.

All we did was share the love of Jesus and his work in our lives.

So, where do we go from here?

Here are a few ideas for you to consider as you think about sharing the Biggest Idea Ever:

- 1. Consider inviting a group of friends, extended family, or coworkers to read this book together. Read and discuss 1-2 chapters a week. Share your reflections and applications.
- 2. Continue the journey by reading and obeying Bible passages together. You don't need experts, only a desire to obey and apply what you learn. Appendix A provides a series of Bible stories you can read and apply together.

3. As you apply Scripture, you will be following the path in chapter 13. You're becoming a

church, but don't freak out! Remember my sister Patty's church in a muffler shop? Your

house church is now a part of Jesus' Kingdom movement. Just stay focused on loving each

other and obeying.

4. Develop leaders. Appendix B provides a list of Kingdom classics that will help deepen you

and other leaders who emerge from your group. There are more resources available to help

you on my website: www.denisbeausejour.com

5. Encourage your church to invite new people and start new discovery groups like you did

in point 1 above. Keep repeating the process, just like the early church!

Each of our stories is unique. God can use anyone willing. My story is just one of many. I'm

not special, but Jesus is. He can do miracles through you if you are willing to trust and obey!

Jesus works with ordinary people through the trials and disappointments of life. It won't all

be roses. As I have shared in these stories, following Jesus involves suffering, heartbreak,

setbacks, and failures.

His Kingdom is an opposed work.

But his promise is to never leave us. He will complete the good work he has begun in us.

Love the Father.

Trust and obey the King.

Walk in the Spirit.

May Jesus and his Kingdom become the heartbeat of your life, so that you, your friends,

and family can trade anxiety, fear, and burnout for peace, purpose, and significance.

Appendix A:

Stories to Discover Together

In each week's meeting ask these seven questions:

- 1. What am I thankful for? Leads to thanksgiving.
- 2. What challenges do I have? Leads to prayer.
- 3. Who needs help, or who can we serve? Leads to service.
- 4. Did I do what I said I would last week? Accountability.
- 5. What does today's text say? Leads to revelation.
- 6. How will I apply this text personally? Obedience.
- 7. Who will I share this with? Leads to multiplication.

Study one story each week in your discovery group:

- 2. Creation of the man and woman Genesis 2:4-25
- 3. The first sin and judgment Genesis 3:1-24
- 4. Sin spreads to the children of Adam and Eve Genesis 4:1-16
- 5. Sin spreads to the whole world, God sends the flood Genesis 6:11-22, 7:11-23, 8:14-22
- 6. God's promise to Abraham Genesis 12:1-9, 15:1-6
- 7. God gives a substitute sacrifice for Isaac Genesis 22:1-19
- 8. Abraham's descendants enslaved, God chooses Moses as liberator Exodus 1:1-14, 3:1-9.
- 9. The Passover: the blood and the lamb Exodus 12:1-28
- 10. God gives His ten laws and sacrifice for breaking the law Exodus 20:1-21, Leviticus 4:1-4

- 11. God's people continually sin Judges 2:10-23
- 12. God promises a Redeemer Isaiah 9:1-7, 52:13-53:12
- 13. Birth of Jesus according to prophecy Matthew 1:1-25
- 14. Baptism of Jesus Matthew 3:13-17; John 1:29-34
- 15. Temptation of Jesus Matthew 4:1-11
- 16. Jesus has authority to forgive sin: The paralyzed man and four friends Luke 5:17-26
- 17. Jesus has power over nature Mark 4:35-41
- 18. Jesus has authority over spirits Mark 5:1-20
